## Pastor's Letter

Welcome to the season of Lent. This is one of my favorite seasons of the church year. In contrast to the big, bold celebrations of Christmas, Easter, Pentecost, even Advent with it's eager leaning and Epiphany with it's light, Lent's quieter, stripped down tone feels like a welcome relief in a world that feels constantly on the move.

Our readings for this Lenten season give us contrasting images of parched deserts and streams of living water. The Gospel readings too are contradictory. Nicodemus who comes at night to ask of being born from above. The woman at the well offered living water. The man born blind who alone can see. And finally, Lazarus, the dead man who was raised. All of this points us to the greatest contradiction of all, a God who's greatest glory and triumph

is made known through death on a cross, and who rose from the dead so that we might know that death had been defeated.

One of the clearest images of the powerful contradictions of Lent is the one we use at the start of the season, the ashes of Ash Wednesday. The ashes we use from Ash Wednesday come from the burned palm fronds from Palm Sunday the previous year. Every year on Palm Sunday, we process triumphantly into the sanctuary singing “Hosanna to the Son of David” and “Blessed is the One who comes in the name of the Lord.” After worship, we gather up all those palms, symbols of our shouts of praise, and they sit on a shelf in the sacristy for the next ten and a half months. After which I take them out and burn them in an old soup pot I commandeered from the co-op donation closet for just that purpose (the pot is on the top of the bookshelf in my office. In case you’ve ever wondered why I keep a soup pot in my office, that’s why). One of the articles I was reading offered the movement of last year’s palms to this year’s ashes as an opportunity to reflect on the question, what is breaking down (in individuals, in our congregations, in our communities, and in the world)? What fresh hopes of the past year are now burned out? And – and this is the crucial “and” of this reflection – what is waiting to be (re)born? As a child of the wildfire-prone west I know this is a thing that is true but often forgotten about ashes, ashes are not the remains of destruction, ashes are the stuff of new life. They are the carbon-rich fuel out of which forests are born.

As we walk through this season of Lent, look for the life that is rising out of the ashes. Look for the sparks of green taking advantage of the rich soil of earlier efforts. Everything that came before is the stuff of new creation.

### Woman's Co-op Executive Director Report February 2023



***Faces of membership.***

No matter where you go in this world, even the Woman's Co-op, attitude, and effort matters. Now some places are more forgiving than others. Here at the Co-op, there is much room for missteps and grace. There has to be when you are learning to walk a new way. No one is going to get it completely right with their first steps. But with the grace there has to be boundaries. The boundaries are important for everyone to feel safe, welcome, wanted and valued. And one of the boundaries at our core is respect. At Woman's Co-op you have to respect who we serve and those who do the serving.

Respect for the people we serve is always at the forefront of any and all our interactions and transactions. It is one of the main reasons there is so much room for grace around here.

This respect must move both ways. Our people have to respect the ones who serve and the organization as a whole. I was faced with these principles a couple of times this past month and they are easier to say than live out at times. Everett was an awesome training candidate in the janitorial program. He had spent the bulk of his career as a cook but now the physical requirements of the job were too much for his health. We considered and discussed somewhere in the commercial janitorial field, perhaps even supervision, since he had been showing the new trainees what to do since his first week. That's when an opportunity caught his eye. Kellogg Community College was planning to host a Microsoft Office certificate program at the Co-op. We encouraged him to test and apply. When he was accepted, we all celebrated. But then Everett's diabetes became unmanageable, he had to be hospitalized three different times during the course. KCC regrettably had to drop him from the program. Everett felt defeated for sure. His car was in need of repairs he could not afford to do, he owed fines and fees on his driver's license. The stipends from KCC and the Co-op along with his disability was his means of just surviving. In true Co-op style we offered Everett the opportunity to fill a contract position under our KCC grant. He would serve as the immediate supervisor and trainer to the Janitorial Program for 20 weeks. This would allow time for his medications and health matters to balance out, his car repairs to be done and a chance to find a part-time job that his current health conditions would allow. It was great, until it wasn't great. Everette's whole attitude shifted. The church and Co-op changed a couple of needed policies and processes (use of the kitchen and its equipment) and Everett moved through the building for days grumbling. I pulled him aside, let him explain why he was so upset, assured him I understood but also explained why the changes were necessary. He said he understood, as well he understood the damage his attitude caused to the harmony and well being of the group as a whole. I thought we were good, lesson learned. Then a few days later Everett was grumbling again, this time to new training candidates. It was about the change in policy to when stipend checks were handed out. Staff used to provide trainees with their checks on Wednesday to cash on Thursday. However, some were cashing them early and not showing up on Thursday, Everett included. So, I stopped the privilege of anyone getting them early. I called Everett aside again for a discussion, once again he assured me, he understood he was just mad. Once again, I explained the dangers of these kind of attitudes in the organization. Before the week was out Everett had two confrontations with staff where he was elevated and aggressive. I had no choice but to end his assignment. After a couple of days had passed Everett called me. He wanted to say I was right, and he was so sorry for the way he had spoken about Woman's Co-op and the church. He said he knew he was blowing it but he couldn't seem to stop himself until it was to late. I hope Everett is able to regulate the behavior and find that great opportunity he very much deserves, even more I hope Co-op can help him find it.

It was just an average Tuesday, well at least it started out that way. Then Kayla called in sick leaving me and Valerie to manage the training candidates. Now there's something we should be familiar with but funny what you can become unfamiliar with once someone else takes it over. Not to mention we still had to perform our job duties as well that day. Let's just say it was a bit stressful. I started out the morning assigning the front desk trainees their duties for the day. One of the new trainees caught my attention, she seemed disconnected, laid back in her chair half sleeping. When she did engage, she was rolling her eyes. I asked if anyone had any questions or needed help getting started, she stated she wasn't even clear on how anything worked it was her second day and now her trainer wasn't here. I assured her that both Valerie and I were here to assist with anything she needed as well as answer any questions. She said she didn't understand any of it. I asked if she had orientation to go over her training folder the day before? She said yes but still didn't understand. I said OK let's start there. I carefully went over the folder with her and answered any questions she had. Then I assigned her to Sara, a training candidate that was in week four of training and understood the ropes a bit better. I said she could shadow Sara until she was more comfortable or even all day until Kayla returned the next day. I also let her know again that Valerie and I were there to assist with anything she needed. The girl rolled her eyes at me and said, "yea I need a bottle of water". We were currently out of bottled water, but I offered her the one from my lunch bag. Then I left her and Sara at the front desk. A few minutes later I heard the young lady criticizing the co-op and it's training program, "how they going to have a training program without a trainer" and even with her here I don't know what I am supposed to be doing". I heard Sara reassuring her it would all get easier with time but still she complained and criticized the program and Co-op. I called her in the office to ask why she was so upset, explained that at no time in any of her training would she have a trainer looking over her shoulder every step of the way. That she was treated with respect that day, assured that if she needed anything all she needed to do was ask. Instead, she chose to talk badly about the entire program at the front desk rather than to share her concerns. I let her know this was not a good first impression and not the level of professionalism we expected at the front desk. I suggested she leave for the day and come back tomorrow if this was still something she wanted to do. She promptly let me know she would not be returning. It bothered me even though I knew I was right. I questioned rather I had done everything I could to connect her to the training. At the end of the day, I did. We have just six weeks to teach someone to manage a front desk reception, rule number one; don't talk poorly about the organization you are assigned to in front of the public. Attitude and effort are everything.



1. We have raised \$9,635.00 in our 2023 Annual Appeal
2. Valerie and Mia placed our first two training candidates at Bronson Battle Creek Hospital.
3. I am currently negotiating a contract with Geislinger Corporation. This contract will be small in numbers of placements, in fact limited to just one or two. But it looks a bit different as well, it will be considered an apprenticeship program for skilled trades (machine operators, tool and die). These will lead to good careers for our people.
4. I would like to begin researching small janitorial contracts locally. It would allow us to have additional work training sites and could operate much like our current contracts do.
5. We are set to teach our first Bridges out of Poverty class session at Calhoun County Alternative High school this month. As I previously discussed we will teach four classes a year across the community for two years. We wanted the groups to represent a wide range of the community's voice. I am please to be able to include a group of high school seniors. I am looking forward to sharing data and stories as we move forward with the project.
