Pastor's Letter

The midweek Advent services at St. Peter are looking at familiar Advent hymns and the scriptures they come from. This week's focus is O Come, O Come Emmanuel. I lost myself in a rabbit hole of fun facts working on this, and decided it was too interesting not to share it with all of you. So if you came to the November 30th Advent service, sorry you're getting this twice. But if you didn't and you enjoy this article, consider coming to the following weeks (Thursdays at St. Peter, there is a potluck at 6 pm, worship starts at 7 pm).

A little bit of history to get us started. The hymnal attributes this hymn to the *Pslateriolum Cantionum Catholicarum*, an ancient book of Latin poetry and music. It was probably written for a monastic community in the 8th or 9th century. Called the "O Antiphons," antiphon being a churchy word for a short sentence sung with a refrain, O referencing that they all start O something. Or, my favorite term for it, because it sounds fun, these chants were also called the "Great Os." The antiphons were sung, one a day, for the seven days leading up to Christmas Eve. The final antiphon, which we sing first and last, this call for Emmanuel to come, would be paired with the Magnificat, the song Mary sang in Luke chapter 1 while visiting Elizabeth. I find this history so powerful because it reminds me that when we sing O Come, O Come Emmanuel, we are entering into a millennia old tradition of calling on God to come. We are joining our voices with millions of believers before us, who have sung these words as they awaited the coming Savior. This hymn gets to one of my favorite things about the Christian tradition, we didn't make it up. We weren't the first and we won't be the last. We are simply taking our place in the choir of the faithful, singing as long as our voices carry and then passing the song along to those who follow.

The antiphons each begin with descriptions of the coming Messiah in the Old Testament. O come, O Wisdom, O Lord of might, O Branch of Jesse,

O Key of David, O Dayspring, O King of nations. The Messiah will bring wisdom, power, hope, continuity, they will rule over the nations. And finally, O come, Emmanuel. Emmanuel the one the prophet Isaiah foretold. Who's name, as the Gospel of Matthew tells us, means God with us. Oh, and check this, this is a total fun fact, but those monks, super clever. We sing it in English, but it was originally sung in Latin. So, the antiphons would have started O Sapentia for Wisdom, O Adonai, a Hebrew word for God, O Radix Jessi, stem or root of Jesse, O Clavis David, Key of David, O Oriens, dayspring, O Rex Genitium, King of the Gentiles, O Emmanuel. Take the first letter of each of those words, and you get SARCORE. Which, if in reverse is the Latin phrase ero cras, which means, "I will be present tomorrow." The monks buried the promise of God with us in the order of the verses of the song. We sing O Come Emmanuel both first and last, bookending the promise, but our ancestors held off on Emmanuel until the very end because Emmanuel, God with us, was the promise the whole, not just hymn, but our faith is built on. This promise that God is with us, that God slips into skin to be with us.

I don't have O Come, O Come Emmanuel on the Sunday hymn list until Christmas Eve. Which, it occurs to me is fitting, given this history. But maybe consider reading or singing it yourself as a devotional practice as we move through the Advent season. And if you do, as you do, I invite you to set aside all the historical fun facts I just gave you and let these ancient words wrap around you and run through you. Consider as you sing them, the millions of voices who have sung them before you, the millions yet to sing them who will sing them in days and weeks and years and millennia to come. And remember that promise that echoes through all of them, that the one who was promised is coming.

RECIPE CORNER

Dark Chocolate Salted Caramel Oreo Pie

- 1 Regular Package Oreos (about 35) minus 1 because you always need an Oreo Cookie
- 1 C. Butter (2 sticks)
- 2/3 C. Packed Brown Sugar
- 1 ¼ C. Heavy Cream

1 12oz Package Dark Chocolate Chips (Note: not semi-sweet. Also, the packages now are 10oz so I buy a second bag & add some.)

- Crush Oreos (food processor if you have one), add 1 stick of melted butter, mix and press in a pie plate or a spring form pan with the crust going up the sides of the pan. (I have a friend that used a square baking pan too.). Freeze 10 minutes.
- Combine butter stick #2 and brown sugar in a small pan. Cook over medium heat whisking until it starts to bubble. Continue for 1 minute. Remove and slowly whisk in ¼ C cream until smooth. Cool 15 minutes. Pour over the crust and return to the freezer for 30-45 minutes. Do not fully freeze caramel.
- Place chocolate chips in a glass bowl. In a small saucepan, bring 1 C. cream to a simmer over medium-high heat. Pour over chocolate chips and allow to set 5 minutes and then whisk until completely smooth. Pour over the caramel and freeze for 30 minutes OR refrigerate covered until ready to serve (this is what I do).
- Just before serving, sprinkle with a flakey salt like kosher salt or sea salt. Store covered and serve chilled.
- The recipe says "Serves 8-12" BUT this is so rich I cut into 16 pieces.

Dear Trinity Lutheran Church Family,

As many of you know, I am a student in the Lutheran Diaconal Association. I attended my first seminar from October 1-6,2023. There were four things that stood out to me most during that week.

- 1. The hospitality that was shown to me during that week.
- 2. The worship services I took part in during that week.
- 3. The learning that took place during that week.
- 4. The friendships that were formed during that week.

I will highlight each of these topics in their own section below.

Hospitality

I was both excited and afraid to be invited to attend this event. I was excited because I view every person I meet as a chance to make a new friend. I was afraid because this would be the first time that I have traveled and stayed away from home for an extended period of time without the assistance of a family member or close friend. I was also afraid because I didn't want others to feel uncomfortable because of my physical challenges. I need not have worried though. Deaconess Diana and Bill Iltzsche shared the gift of hospitality with me by opening their beautiful home to me for the week. Diana is a retired Special Education teacher. Their daughter works as a physical therapist in Fort Wayne, Indiana. The way I move through the world was nothing alarming or new to them.

Worship

Each day we took part in two worship services. One took place in the morning. The second worship service took place in the evening. One of the most meaningful parts of worship for me was being able to hear and start to learn **The Diaconal Litany.** Because of the fact that the Litany is very meaningful as well as very long I have chosen to include only six parts of it here.

L: Merciful Father, compassionate Son, consoling Spirit:

C: Remember in mercy the sick and the dying, The suffering and persecuted, The fearful and distraught, The bored and despairing.

By your goodness grant relief to all in need and strengthen them to trust in you.

L: Son of Righteousness:

C: Take the side of the oppressed; Protect those who are vulnerable, especially the young; Curb sinners in their way; Restore the fallen; And turn all hearts to receive your righteous judgment.

L: Source and end of our salvation:

C: Convert to yourself those who hate you; Arouse those who have become dull towards you; Enlighten those who have closed their eyes to you; Strengthen those who trust you; Guide those who seek you.

L: I believe that God made me and all creatures:

C: Teach me, O my maker, to look up on my person and my abilities as your gifts, so that I may trust your care for me.

So that I may be delivered from jealousy and envy,

So that I may see you hidden in my neighbor and there serve you with gladness.

L: I believe that Jesus Christ is my savior:

C: By your cross, loving redeemer, crucify in me all evil desires end unbelief; By your unspotted righteousness, clothe me in your own self that I may be delivered to God forever;

By your service to fallen humanity, lead me to serve you among the fallen of the earth; By your glorious resurrection from the dead, raise me to live with you forever.

L: I believe in the Holy Spirit, Lord and Giver of Life:

C: Raise me up anew, creator Spirit, by confidence in your daily and rich forgiveness of my sins;

Bind me in unity of love with the saints in your community;

Awaken me to the presence of your saints in unexpected places; Quicken in me lively anticipation of my resurrection from the dead.

Learning

I learned so many things at student seminar, that sometimes it felt as though my brain would not be able to hold anymore information. The seminar had two Hallmarks or main ideas.

1. Mutuality involves intention, discernment and fairness.

At the end of the week my group taught about mutuality by acting out three skits that we had written. This was so much fun. Each of us used one of our previously identified strengths to show that we understood the meaning of mutuality.

- 2. Diaconal Focus involves recognizing brokenness in our world and doing what we can as the diaconal community to bring about healing.
- 1. There is brokenness in families due to trauma.
- 2. There is brokenness in our environment due to natural disasters. These might include floods or forest fires.
- 3. There is brokenness in our country due to under employment and homelessness.

Friends: The thing I enjoyed most about student seminar is the friends that I made. When I walked in the room at the beginning of the week we were strangers. By the end of the week, it broke my heart to leave them. We had become diaconal community/family.

Six Women from Church History that You Need to Know About Free Learning Opportunity through the Synod

The North/West Lower Michigan Synod announces the next session of our Adult Theological Education program: Six Women from Church History that You Need to Know About. Join the Rev. Dr. Joy Schroeder for a six-week study of Christian women through the ages starting on January 16, 2024!

The Rev. Dr. Joy Schroeder, an ELCA pastor, is Professor of Church History at Capital University, where she teaches in the Department of Religion and Philosophy and Trinity Lutheran Seminary. She holds the Trinity Chair in Lutheran Heritage. Dr. Schroeder earned a B.A. in Classics from Luther College, a Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary, and a Ph.D. from the University of Notre Dame.

She is the author of five books on the history of how Christians and Jews have interpreted scripture. Her most recent book, co-authored with Marion Ann Taylor (University of Toronto) is Voices Long Silenced: Women Biblical Interpreters through the Centuries (Westminster John Knox Press, 2022).

Ever since the beginning of Christianity, women have been teachers, writers, and preachers of the Gospel. Learn about the struggles and accomplishments of six exemplary women from church history:

Perpetua (d. ca. 202), North African martyr and visionary writer Hildegard of Bingen (1098-1179), Saxon nun and theologian Argula von Grumbach (ca. 1492-ca. 1554), Bavarian Lutheran reformer and pamphlet writer Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz (1648-1695), Mexican nun and poet Jarena Lee (1783-1864), African American preacher Pandita Ramabai (1858-1922), Indian Bible translator and founder of women's shelters Dr. Schroeder will discuss these women's inspirational lives and writings.

The class will meet on six consecutive Tuesday evenings: January 16, 23, 30, February 6, 13, 20, 2024 from 7:00 – 8:15pm ET via Zoom. This course is open to all adults, both laypeople and rostered ministers, and is free of charge. Sessions will be recorded and available to registered participants. ELCA presiding bishop issues statement on Israel-Hamas war

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning?" —Psalm 22:1

Dear church,

As Lutherans, we are accustomed to holding tension between two truths. Thus the ELCA denounces the egregious acts of Hamas, acts that have led to unspeakable loss of life and hope. At the same time the ELCA denounces the indiscriminate retaliation of Israel against the Palestinian people, both Christian and Muslim.

For the past week we have borne witness to the horrors of the escalating crisis between Israel and Hamas. We also watch a growing humanitarian crisis in Gaza as Israel blocks food, water, fuel and medical supplies and as airstrikes continue to cause unbearable civilian casualties ahead of a just-announced ground assault. We see Israelis and families around the world in the agonizing wait for word about the fate of loved ones killed or taken hostage by Hamas. We are in anguish, grieving and praying for all people who are living in trauma, fear and uncertainty.

Among us are Palestinian Lutherans who are fearful for their families, their communities and their homeland. In our communities we have Jewish and Muslim neighbors, who are also facing the horrors of this crisis and its impact on their loved ones.

It is difficult to find words that suffice in the complexity of this moment, and in the web of relationships that bind us together, as church, with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land and our interreligious partners. Yet God has called us to be a people who stand with others amid suffering.

We must also call a thing a thing. The power exerted against all Palestinian people — through the occupation, the expansion of settlements and the escalating violence — must be called out as a root cause of what we are witnessing. We are committed to our long-standing accompaniment of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land.

The God who liberates us calls us to be a liberating witness. May it be so.
