God Sightings

I was sitting at my desk today, working on the bulletin, when the Co-op Front Desk person knocked on my door. "There's a man in front who wants to make a tithe offering?" she said with a question in her voice. I admit I assumed she misunderstood, and it was one of you trying to drop off an offering envelope or something, so I followed her to the entryway to see a man I didn't know sitting on the pew. "I want to tell you a story," he told me, "Do you know where James Street is?" I told him I did, and he proceeded to tell me about his cousin, who lived on James Street, struggled with addiction and depression, wanted community but was never able to find it, and had passed away in an automobile accident. "He never made it to this church," he told me. "I go to the church down the street from my house. This would have been the church he could have walked to, but he never managed to overcome his demons enough to get out of his house. So, I'm here for him, to give you this, because he never got to come." And with that, he handed me a twenty-dollar bill and got up to leave. I asked him his cousin's name (Robert) and told him I would pray for him and his cousin, and he left. And as I walked back down the hall to label the \$20 and put it in Doug's box for deposit I thought, I saw God today. I saw God in a man who loved his cousin, and in being reminded that we are the kind of church that neighbors know is theirs, even if they never make it through our doors.

Over the summer we will be starting worship by sharing our God Sightings. God Sightings are places we saw God show up in the world. God Sightings don't have to be big things like people showing up out of the blue and handing you money. In my sermon on Sunday, I talked about how I saw God in a woman getting her cane stuck in the library book drop. I see God every time I drive past the Little Free Library and see books added and removed. And in the baby birds that just hatched in my in-laws driveway, and their very protective parents. God Sightings are all around us, if we learn to look for them. This is why we will be starting worship by sharing them with each other, to train our eyes to be open to all of the ways and places God is showing up in our world. I can't wait to hear from you where you are seeing God in your lives.

Council President's Letter

Bless the Children

The theme of the North/West Lower Michigan Synod ELCA Assembly in May was "It's About Jesus." Bishop Satterlee encouraged participants to share examples of where they see Jesus at work in the world. He specifically requested a few synod representatives to share their witnesses to the Assembly regarding a favorite Bible story and our views of Jesus at work in our lives. Pastor Kjersten and I were asked to share our witnesses. Given Pastor's request for Trinity to follow suit in sharing weekly examples of God at work in our world, I am sharing my witness from the Assembly.

Nothing puts a big smile on my face and sends a chill up my spine more than a congregation enthusiastically singing a classic Lutheran hymn with the organ cranked up, the walls pulsating – give me a Holy, Holy, Holy or Praise to the Lord the Almighty, anytime. It was Jesus who awoke me, giving voice and talents to praise God.

A cradle to grave Lutheran, I recall this experience from a young age. Growing up in Central Lutheran Church in Minneapolis, as the son of a music teacher there was never a question I would sing in the choir. My first experience understanding and singing hymns – was in the youngest, Cherub Choir – beginning to recognize music as a part of worship. The enthusiasm Jesus instilled remains as a lifelong chorister.

As with you, there are many other spiritual practices, traditions, liturgies and beliefs Jesus instilled at an early age which remain a part of me today. Music among them. These responses have been very consistent and reliable over decades of intervening events, challenges, changes and experiences. These childhood gifts are a reminder of Jesus' early and persistent presence, providing talents, support and opportunities to experience fulfillment and to praise God.

I find music across the lifespan to be a metaphor for all Jesus provides children for their growth. Diane and I have five grandchildren – 8 and under. They sing all the time and we have two aspiring violinists, two piano players and one learning the recorder. Also, being the children of music teachers, they have no choice but to develop their musical talents for the enjoyment of themselves and others. Jesus' gifts of their talents have already been used to praise God. Yet music is only one of a multitude of gifts.

My inspirational story about Jesus, is the Blessing of the Children in Mark 10 - the importance of children to Jesus of all his children. At the request of parents and over the protests of the disciples, Jesus "took the children in his arms and placed his hands on their heads and blessed them." We know his care goes beyond blessing. Jesus' persistent nurturance of children provides all child essential talents and strengths.

Each child is a canvas on which Jesus' gifts are expressed.

It is a source of profound gratification to witness the development of children and realization of their unique gifts – sharing their artwork, reading first words, watching their sports, graduations...We all see daily examples of Jesus' gifts to the children as they prosper. Jesus is persistently in the world with them. As adults, Jesus reminds me of our responsibility, by his example, to support, recognize and promote those talents. To provide protection and safety for their growth. To be ever mindful of God's children and guide them in knowing Jesus.

Tragically, we know so many children who lack the opportunity to know Jesus. In my work as a psychologist, I see daily examples of children deprived of the fulfillment of their gifts. Often due to societal barriers, children lack opportunities and the ability to grow in healthy circumstances. In our church we grieve their absence. We pray Jesus provides for their needs and guides us as a church in connecting and nurturing them.

As Jesus blesses the children, he reminds us as adults we need to become like children to enter the Kingdom of Heaven. "For the kingdom of God belongs to those who are like these children." Accepting Jesus' gifts in the spirit of childhood enthusiasm, closeness in relationship and willingness to learn. Most importantly, confessing Jesus is Lord and believing God raised him from the dead for our salvation.

Jesus loves all his children. Our prayer is all children have a smile and chill up their spines from knowing Jesus' love.
