Pastor's Letter

"What's a Seraphim?"

During the Easter season the preface (that's the words I say during communion before we sing the Holy Holy) ends with the line, "as so with Mary Magdalene and Peter and all the witnesses of the resurrection, with earth and sea and all their creatures, and with angels and archangels, cherubim and seraphim, we praise your name and join their unending hymn." You probably know what/who most of those things/people are. Mary Magdalene and Peter, of course disciples of Jesus as the first witnesses to the resurrection. Earth and sea and all their creatures, that's all of creation. Even angels and archangels, ok. But maybe you've wondered, what's a cherubim and seraphim?

Short answer, they're angels. Types of angels, really. Cherubim, an alliteration of the Hebrew word, probably derives from the Akkadian *karabu*, "to bless" or "one who blesses." They show up 91 times throughout the Old Testament, doing a variety of different things, but most commonly they carry the throne of God. And you know how I've commented before that there is a reason angels in the Bible always open with "Do not be afraid." Check out Ezekiel's description of the cherubim:

This was their appearance: they were of human form. Each had four faces, and each of them had four wings. Their legs were straight, and the soles of their feet were like the sole of a calf's foot; and they sparkled like burnished bronze. 8Under their wings on their four sides they had human hands. And the four had their faces and their wings thus: their wings touched one another; each of them moved straight ahead, without turning as they moved. As for the appearance of their faces: the four had the face of a human being, the face of a lion on the

right side, the face of an ox on the left side, and the face of an eagle; such were their faces. Their wings were spread out above; each creature had two wings, each of which touched the wing of another, while two covered their bodies. Ezekiel 1:5-11

Wild, eh. So that's cherubim. Seraphim come from the Hebrew *saraph*, meaning "burning" or "burning one." They are frequently depicted as flying serpents. Also, fun fact, the -im at the end of both words is the plural ending in Hebrew, like the -s in English. There are references to Cherubs in scripture, but no Seraphs. Seraphim are always plural, they always come with others.

Seraphim show up a few times in scripture, but the two that have the most relevance to why they show up in our liturgy are from Isaiah 6:1-3 and Revelation 4:6-8. In both of those examples, the seraphim are described as flying around the throne of God, singing praises. And the song they are singing, see of this sounds familiar to you.

'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory.' (Isaiah 6:3b) 'Holy, holy, the Lord God the Almighty, who was and is and is to come.' (Revelation 4:8b).

That's the song we sing on Sundays when we "praise your name and join their unending hymn." We're joining in the song of the seraphim, the song sung in praise of God since creation first began, and the song that will be sung until the end of days. So sing out loud on the Holy, Holy, because we are singing the song of the angels.

As we emerge from COVID it is gratifying to see the renewed focus on stewardship of our building. One of our most valuable resources is Trinity's building which provides many opportunities for our ministry. Resuming the Property Committee under Eileen Martens' leadership generated a working list of building maintenance/improvements. These items have been identified to preserve the quality, comfort and safety of the building. Many congregation members have volunteered to complete these tasks as a form of giving.

Giving financially for the benefit of our building is another form of generosity. As you know, some time ago we identified nonbudgeted major repairs needed for our aging building. Numerous congregation members responded to a request for a Special Building Fund and \$8,276 was donated by December 2021. The Council prioritized the projects necessary for safety,

energy conservation and aesthetics. Replacement of the large windows at the front of the church, repair and installation of aluminum facia on the South side of the building and replacement of the two West doors were identified. By now I hope everyone has seen the new metal doors installed at the West hallway and kitchen which are a huge improvement. With these three major projects completed the Council is pleased to report the Special Building Fund was used for those important projects. We thank all who contributed and supported these tasks.

The Property Committee will be continuing to address their maintenance, repair and improvements list. I have seen many examples of generosity in maintaining our home. There will be numerous future opportunities for giving of time, talents and financial gifts to allow us to take pride in the blessing of our building. Trinity is a busy place and activity is increasing as we resume programs. If you see something that needs attention, discuss it with a Council or Property Committee member. If you are so inclined to volunteer to address an issue, small or large, let us know as well.

Pastor plans to include a blessing of the results of the Special Building Fund projects in a future service. Let us take that time to appreciate all the ways our building has served us and our community.

Woman's Co-op Executive Director Report April 2023



Faces of membership.

Every person who lays their head in Battle Creek Michigan for consecutive days is a citizen of Battle Creek Michigan. As citizens they should be afforded and allowed all the same opportunities with an equal voice in their collectivity. Unfortunately, not everyone agrees with me. There are some citizens who feel like others have not earned their right to be regarded as much as those who have. Tragically not everyone feels like they are equal citizens either.

Some feel like they are on the outside seemingly as spectators of the life that is happening all around them. They feel unequipped and unable to truly participate in the opportunities being offered. The reasons vary to why they feel this way, feeling less than for their lack of education, position, or economic level. For some they are made to feel disconnected due to their past choices, even those they have paid for. Others actively suffer through mental health issues, sometimes even undiagnosed ones.

When these citizens are required to have involvement or engage for survival in systems or private agencies they rarely argue with its process or advocate for their individual circumstances. And in most cases, they don't know how to advocate for themselves.

Woman's Co-op considers this reality in every exchange we experience. Rather it is our work with these systems and agencies or case management for a client. We strive to give voice for these citizens and empower them to do the same. We encourage them to actively participate in their community, to not count themselves out of its opportunities. And one of the most important things we do is inspire them to tell their own story, proudly and boldly.

We continue to work with the Attorney General's Office to map out our Driver's Restoration Clinic. Valerie and I joined Michigan Works staff and lead attorney for Legal Services on a site visit to Lansing's clinic.

Armand Hudson, training at Snackwerks has qualified as "Mixer" which results in a lead position and a \$1.00 an hour raise! Armand is only half way through his twenty-week training.

On May 19th at 5:30pm at Trinity Lutheran we will celebrate fifty-one graduates. A stellar year for Co-op! This is the highest number of graduates we have ever celebrated.

Currently we are serving # 167 members / participants.

We need to figure out a way to meet tuition for onsite training – we had \$60,000 from Michigan Works and just over \$25,000 from Kellogg Community College under their workforce grants but we have expended all of those dollars for this year. We have over twenty-five people on the waiting list. I am working with Valerie to secure two avenues, one- a grant source and two- DHHS path program. So far, the path program has approved and paid for one trainee.

Trinity Becoming A Community Center Concept

The Annual Meetings of congregations provide a time of reflection on the life of the church in the past year as well as a vision for the future. As we mark the unfortunate third anniversary of the COVID pandemic it seems that all of our reports of church activity are tainted by this adverse influence. It has been gratifying to see Trinity emerging from the pandemic and resuming many aspects of our ministry.

For some time, discussions in our congregation regarding long-range planning have included the concept of converting our building into a "community center" as an expression of our social ministry in the Eastside of Battle Creek. I appreciated the discussion of this concept at our Annual Meeting on March 5th as there were many helpful questions and observations. As we deal with reduced human and financial resources, this approach seems to hold promise for our enduring ministry through the use of one of greatest assets – our building. The potential partnerships in this model actually expand the impact of Trinity's spiritual and social ministry.

The Trinity Council will continue to explore this model through affordable resources. One of the challenges is the uniqueness of this concept and limited examples of similar implementation. Yet, it is this same uniqueness that has drawn interest from numerous sources in the church and non-profit arenas. As we gather information on our options, we look forward to discussion and input from the Trinity community in deciding on the appropriate plan going forward. Please share your thoughts and questions to assist in guiding us into the next phase of our life as a congregation.




All the answers are names of flowers. If you're completely stumped, the answers are printed below. Of course, they're upside down so you can't peek. Enjoy!
