## **Pastor's Letter**

The wagon in the entryway that collects donations for the food pantry is not the same wagon. It looks very similar to the old one, but it's not the old one. I want to tell you about how we came to need, and have, a new wagon, because it was my God Sighting for the week.

You have probably noticed over the last month or so there has been a lot more stuff in the social hall and generally around the building. Co-op has connected with a new partner who has been really generous in bringing much needed donations for families settling into new housing. Co-op, being Co-op, has made good use of those donations and has connected with a lot more people to make sure the new donations get into the hands of those who need them. This also means we've had a lot of new people in the building recently. And when you have a lot of new people doing new things, miscommunications can occur. One of those miscommunications was someone thought the wagon was one of those donations and took it home with them.

Simple miscommunication, that's all it was. When I heard the wagon was missing and the theory of what happened to the wagon, I wasn't too concerned about it. I wasn't happy about it; we use that wagon all the time for the food pantry. But it was an honest mistake, mistakes happen, and we can figure out another solution. I asked Kayla from Co-op to try and chase down the wagon for us, and she agreed to do her best. Kayla and I both knew there was no guarantee we could find and return the wagon not knowing who'd taken it, but we'd try.

James, the janitorial training person, on the other hand, was not satisfied with Kayla and my solution. This was the church's wagon, not Co-op's wagon, and even if it was an honest mistake, it needed to be rectified. I tried to assure him I wasn't concerned, and James gave me a nod, like "I hear you Pastor, but I don't care. This is a problem that needs to be fixed." The next morning, I walk into the building and James is sitting at the front desk. "Look what showed up," he said, gesturing down the hall. The first thing I noticed was the hallway was clear and empty for the first time in several weeks. Then, I saw the wagon. James had gone home that evening, and scoured Facebook Marketplace for a replacement red sided wagon, as close to the missing wagon as he

could find. The new wagon had apparently beaten me to the building by minutes. "And no one else but the church is going to touch this wagon," James informed me. "I don't care," I said. "Anyone can use the wagon, it's a useful wagon." "No," he countered, "this is the church's wagon, only the church can use this wagon." Will we be the only ones to ever use the wagon? Let's be realistic, no. But the thought and the emphasis behind James's declaration reminded me of the beauty and challenge of community.

We've been talking a lot recently and will talk more in the meeting on the 17<sup>th</sup> and in the weeks and months to come, about really leaning into being a community center. The key word in that idea is "community." What does it mean to be a community, what does it mean to live together in community? How will we make it work? What challenges will we face and how will we face them? I think the wagon incident is a great example of how we already make this work, and how we will continue to. We do this with grace and respect. With understanding that mistakes happen, stuff gets misplaced, people are people. We're all here trying to do best we can to love God and love our neighbors. And sometimes we're going to have to go out of our way to fix problems that weren't ours. That's what James did. He's not the reason we lost the wagon, but when he saw there was a problem, he stepped up and made it right. This is the culture we're trying to create together.

Woman's Co-op **Executive Director Report** August 2023

For the early part of the Woman's Co-op, we kept our focus on feeding and managing the network and redefining poverty for families in Battle Creek through the cooperative assistance approach. In 2010 the concept for our Work Experience Program was born. The program would allow members to gain marketable skills for employment and provide vital services for the organization (front desk reception and janitorial building services). In 2012 we worked with Battle Creek Community Foundation supported consultants to determine an expansion to the Work Experience Program that would earn revenue for the organization. As a result, the Industrial Sewing Classroom was added. Which later launched the Butterfly Boutique, an online and on-site store to sell products made by students. The addition of industrial sewing has not reached its goal of being a lucrative social enterprise for the organization, however it has fulfilled the needs of the students. In 2022 we expanded the Work Experience program to include offsite employer partners. The Co-op places potential employees for an 8–22-week training period with these local employers under contract. Co-op receives a fee for each trainee and trainees receive a training stipend. This expansion is proving to be a worthy social enterprise with the potential to support a large part of our program budget within three-five years.



From behind the doors of Trinity Lutheran Church...

We signed a placement contract with Community Action Agency to place early childhood workers for sixteen local facilities. Placements that will lead participants through to associate degree in early childhood education.

We had a site visit from United Way. It went very well. Leading to other potential ways they could support Woman's Co-op.

I have been invited to be a guest on a panel for the Council for Michigan Foundations by WKKF in November. The topic will center on racial and economic disparities for families at or below the poverty line.

Purchased and provided 741 items from the Co-op Store Distributed over 1,500 diapers and wipes Sold six BCBC dolls Created and sold 57 shirts for family camp Created a new Trinity / Co-op sign for Cliff Street entrance

#### **RECIPE CORNER**

#### **THE Brownies**

#### Ingredients:

- Your favorite brownie mix
- Small jar of Marshmallow Crème
- 1 C. Smooth Peanut Butter
- 2 C. (1 Package) Semisweet Chocolate Chips
- 3 C. Rice Krispies.

#### Directions:

- Prepare the brownie mix according to directions in a 9x13 pan. Allow to cool completely.
- Spread the jar of crème evenly over the brownies.
- Melt the chocolate chips in the microwave in a large bowl.
- Stir in peanut butter. Add the Rice Krispies & stir.

#### **Dear Friends**,

As many of you know, in May I received word that I had been accepted into the Education and Formation process of the Lutheran Diaconal Association. This program involves reading assigned text and answering questions that highlight my understanding of the material, seminar attendance, service learning and mentorship with a woman who is currently a deaconess. The program has no set time for completion. Instead, it is based on the development of specific skills and gaining necessary information that will allow me to serve our church and the larger Battle Creek community as a whole in the way that I feel makes the best use of the skills God has given me. Throughout the remainder of this article, I will share the history of the diaconal association. Next, I will share how I have seen God's hand guiding me through this process. Finally, I will share with the reader specific things each of you can do to support me as I take the first steps into ministry with the Lutheran Diaconal Association.

The Lutheran Deaconess Association was founded in 1919 in Fort Wayne, Indiana. Women who became deaconesses were often nurses. If a woman felt called to be a deaconess she was not allowed to marry. At the time, it was believed that marriage would distract a woman from being able to fully follow God's leading in her life. I am so thankful that the Lutheran Diaconal Association has set aside these old fashioned views. For me, having the support of family allows me to serve within the church with a joyful spirit. This joy comes from knowing I can serve God while things at home continue as normal.

Women who entered diaconal ministry were looking for four things. These women had a strong desire to be part of a faith community. These women longed to be supported and nurtured by other women. These women longed for a deeper connection to God. They found this deepening of faith as they worshipped together. These women longed for strong relationships. The foundation of these relationships was twofold. First, these relationships were built on mutual respect. Second, each woman had a desire to honor God in her daily life by finding ways to serve other people. In the 1930's many women wanted to serve as a deaconess not in a hospital setting instead, these women like me wanted to serve in the church.

In 1943, the President of Valpariso University invited the Lutheran Diaconal Association to move their training program to the university. This allowed women to see themselves as capable of both having a career and serving God. In 1988, the LDA developed a distance learning program for adults over 35 years of age. In 2012 the LDA recognized the vital ministry of men in the church. At this time, the Lutheran Diaconal Association welcomed men to become deacons. In 2019 the Lutheran Diaconal Association celebrated 100 years of loving God and serving others.

Pastor Kjersten and I visited the diaconal center on November 30, 2022. I wish that each of you could visit as well. There is a feeling of peace that permeates that environment. There was no pressure to make a hasty decision. The deaconesses that I met invited me into dialog, they invited me to ask questions, they invited me to be vulnerable. Asking me to tell my honest story of what God has brought me through and what I feel He is asking me to do next? I am very excited to share with you that I will be attending my first student seminar at the diaconal center on October 1-6, 2023. I know that in this place of peace and difficult discernment I will be exposed to new ideas. I also know that my call to ministry may be transformed as I go through this process.

In the next part of this article, I will briefly share one God sighting that I have noticed while planning my trip to Valparaiso. I wanted the opportunity to stay in the home of a deaconess, so I could learn about her ministry and make a new friend. I didn't know how comfortable strangers would be having me in their home with my limitations. I will be spending the week with Deaconess Diane and her husband Bill. Diane is a retired Special Education teacher. Her father was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis when Diane was 16 years old. She was her father's caregiver for many years. The couple have a daughter who is a physical therapist. When I talked with Diane on Friday, she was not afraid of my Cerebral Palsy at all. Nor did she seem put off when I talked about my specific needs. This, friends, is a God sighting for me. God found a couple for me to stay with who have knowledge of physical challenges. This couple is willing to see me as a person who might need some extra help and yet still open their home to me.

In the next part of this article, I will share two specific ways you can assist me in my calling to be a deaconess.

- 1. Please pray for me. Pray specifically, that I will be able to complete the assigned readings and dictate the notes before leaving for seminar on October 1, 2023.
- Please pray for myself and the other deaconess students to be able to take in the necessary information without feeling overwhelmed by how much there is to learn.
- 3. Please ask yourself if you have the financial means to support my journey into diaconal ministry? The total amount needed for the entire program is \$ 7,000.00. The amount that I have been asked to submit when I come to seminar in October is \$500.00. Thank you for your prayers and consideration of how you might partner with me as I begin this journey to become a deaconess.

In conclusion, In the first part of this article I shared with the reader the history of the Lutheran Diaconal Association. In the second part of this article, I shared with the reader the story of a God sighting that has been revealed to me as I have begun planning to attend my first Diaconal Student Seminar on October 1-6, 2023. In the final part of this article, I asked for the reader's prayers and financial support as I seek to serve God as a deaconess here at Trinity.
